Why Mwambu's Cradle Publishers?

Close to sixty years since independence we need to decolonise and democratise the field of publishing, which is characterized by an exodus of literary writers flocking to the Global North to find publishers and readers. Yet, Africa is full of people that love great stories. The African Union's Agenda 2063 aspires for Africa's strong cultural identity, common heritage, values and ethics through the promotion of the creative arts and businesses. Oral literature remains the root through which our culture is passed down and mediated through the literary word. Mwambu is the central heroic mythical character of Lumasaaba folklore. His sisters Sera and Nambozo the represent Herstories of the Bamaasaba. It is against this background that the **vision** of Mwambu's Cradle Publishers is: **Wangusa's literacy legacy contributing to Africa's Cultural Renaissance.**

Mwambu's Cradle Publishers will champion Ugandan and African Poetry, Folklore and Literature, through publication as well as through dissemination of the oral recordings by the poets and authors through a wide range of media including online media particularly through online platforms.

Mwambu's Cradle Publishers Objectives

The objectives are the following:

• To publish stories in Lumasaaba and other Ugandan languages for children in line with the Uganda Education Policy for the promotion of early childhood education

- To publish African children's stories in multiple languages in line with the African Union Agenda 2063 aspiration 5 - of Africa with a strong cultural identity, common heritage, values and ethics
- To publish Lumasaaba and other African language dictionaries to preserve and promote the languages for strong cultural identity
- To promote Lumasaaba and other African languages as a cross-border languages particularly between Uganda and Kenya with the aim of forging linguistic and cultural unity within East Africa and Africa in general
- To translate and publish stories in Lumasaaba and other Ugandan languages for children into Kiswahili and other AU languages to expand readership through early childhood education in order to nurture an African citizenship and common heritage
- To publish poetry and novels written in English and other African languages.
- To publish digital and audio-books on e-platforms
- To produce animation films from books based on the oral tradition of Africa

This assertion holds true today, manifested by the increase poetry recitation events in Uganda and Africa as a whole over the past few years.
